Rocco was put to sleep last night. He had a tumour on his spleen and his blood pressure was very low. He'd gone down so quickly yesterday and really didn't seem 'with' us at all, struggling to walk. So we felt with vet's advice it was the kindest thing to do for him, though not for us. We are both in bits and the house and office are hideously quiet.

Losing a collie doesn't get any easier. Really hate not having a bundle of fluff following me around.

Well, our thanks to Rescue for putting us in touch and allowing us to give Rocco a home. It was a total pleasure taking care of him.

I've had lassie collies since being a child, but Rocco was the first blue merle. He certainly did make people notice him wherever we went, with many children saying "he must be very old as he's so grey"! Both Ian and I were amazed how quickly he settled in and seemed pleased he'd no more show rings to deal with. Instead, car trips for beach and forest walks and local National Trust property. We loved getting him used to stairs on his walks. He became such a special dog for us and we are gutted, but it was the kindest thing for him. I did keep telling him I wished we'd had him as a puppy, but at least we had him for a good six years.

The house and office seem way too quiet and, of course, we are both still looking for him, wondering where he is.

Over the last year, we have lost a lot of our Sponsor Dogs, due to old age and medical conditions. This has given us a chance to look at how we raise funds and we have come up with the following. This means you can still support our "Golden Oldies" as a group rather than an individual dog.

#### SUPPORT OUR PERMANENT FOSTER COLLIES

Many collies who come into our care are over the age of 10, or have long term medical conditions that need regular medication which can be very costly for a prospective new owner to afford, and consequentially these collies cannot go through our normal channels for adoption.

Thankfully we are lucky to have some dedicated members of our Charity, and also occasionally other people who feel able to take on the challenges that one of these collies can hold. In these cases we offer financial support, i.e. covering the cost of any excessive vet bills that may arise and also paying for long term medication needed for supporting existing medical conditions.

Over the years we have received a lot of financial support in the way of individual sponsorships for just a handful of these special need collies. What we are suggesting now is that your support is spread to cover ALL our collies in permanent foster.

If you would like to help contribute to this area of our rescue, for any annual donation of £24, or more if you wish, you would receive a twice yearly copy of our "Paws for Thought" newsletter, which will highlight individual cases you have helped us with, and a certificate.

#### LASSIE

RESCUED FROM THE LIVE MEAT MARKET IN CHINA TO LIVING HER BEST LIFE IN SCOTLAND This elderly Collie was brought to our attention via Lesley Bassett. As she did not have any contacts in China she contacted One Paw at a Time Dog Rescue (Romania and China) to ask for their help. They immediately got in touch with their people on the ground who got Lassie to safety. She had to spend quite a few months in a rescue shelter until funds for a flight to the UK could be arranged. Covid had

caused China to increase their flight charges to £4,000, so Lesley and Foreign Dog Rescue started raising funds to cover her stay at the shelter and towards her flight. Eventually a flight was secured for Lassie and she began her journey to safety in the early autumn of 2021, eventually arriving at Heathrow and being placed in a temporary foster home. Interest had been shown for Lassie and she was adopted

by a couple in Lanarkshire, who had recently lost one of their rescue collies, a sponsor dog called Shelby. At this point, Collie Rescue became involved and put Lassie on Permanent Foster Care, as she was presumed to be over 10 years old.

The old girl settled well, and although had one or two medical problems in the beginning is now doing very well, settling in with her other rescue siblings and enjoying all that life has to offer her.
