Jasmine showing her "grumpy" face after a walk in the rain - AGAIN Early in Sept last year we rescued 3 litter brothers from an animal hoarding situation, as the owners were put under pressure from the Authorities to reduce their quantity of animals. These collie brothers were 7 years old, had never lived in a home environment or walked on a lead, in fact never really experienced any of the outside world, having been bred on a smallholding, so we had quite a challenge on our hands.

They were placed in kennels we use in Nottingham and after initially appearing very confused, sad and worried, they soon began to respond to the kindness and nurturing offered by the kennel girls and also our Nottingham representatives Margaret and Lynne who visited regularly to take them on walks and spend time with them. During this time all their medical needs were taken care of and we are pleased to say that things have begun to progress

and their future is now looking more positive.

this he shares with a rough collie bitch, Rosie, who has made him most welcome.

SADIE is a very happy girl and seems as content to be with us as we are to have her. When we lost Riley's brother Harvey so suddenly, we were completely devastated. Then we had heartache and illnesses to overcome and my husband Roy said no more dogs and he meant it. However, I just knew there was the perfect dog out there for us; a dog that just wanted a loving home, company and attention. A dog that didn't need huge long walks or a young family

to keep up with them. A dog that would be happy to just lie at my feet and feel secure and part of the family. Sadie is 100% that dog and more. The irony is, she has ended up being a complete daddy's girl and Roy runs around after her catering to her every whim. We sometimes call her "The Princess" We've said this before, but Sadie has also helped Riley and stopped him from feeling lonely. He's an old man now and I am sure that sometimes she drives him mad but she also helps him feel like a pup again; they get along so well together.

Sadie is funny, fussy, affectionate (she licks everything and everyone. She is partial to feet), loving and sweet. She is prone to being just a little bit naughty though, such as barking at 6am for breakfast, using her bum to knock Riley out of the way and having a little nip when she gets excited and isn't getting enough fuss or attention. When people arrive at the house, she basically blocks them in and jumps up them until she gets a ton of fuss. She also herds people so you can't get around her - she has such a fantastic, mischievous personality and it has really been our privilege watching her come out of her shell and show us who she is. We can't imagine life now without our Sadie Daisy (she has a few nicknames...!). When the time comes to say goodbye to Riley (which we hope it still a few years off yet...), we know she will be there with love, kisses and to lean on us and console us. Sadie's previous owner seemed to think she had landed on her paws when we came to collect her, but I think we are the ones who got lucky.

meeting that a lot of time had been wasted chasing forms. People don't seem to realise that as a Registered Charity we have to have rules. Owners probably feel guilty signing a Release Form or just don't care once the dog has gone. It is not always possible to get them signed on the day of transfer as the dog's situation must come first.

We had a call from a Rescue Centre in Scotland about two elderly collies, whose owner had passed away. They had been placed in a foster home with a child who had trodden on the male, causing him to snap. They were then placed in a second home in the same situation with a small child and an Akita puppy. As the lady was also expecting twins, she found she could not cope, so Rescue were called in. A volunteer went to collect them and they are now living in a lovely house in three acres of grounds. It seems that not all Rescues do their homework first.

Another owner in the same area had taken three dogs to the vets to be euthanized as she wanted to move in with her boyfriend who did not like dogs. We were told that she had got the dogs by telling breeders Collie Rescue had recommended her and she was on their waiting list, so breeders had not checked her out. Please, if unsure check with Rescue or do your own home-checking. These are just a few incidents in Rescue. Some we have shed many tears over, but it would take far too long to report everything.

Thankfully, people outside Committee step in to help if needed and for that we are truly grateful.

On a lighter note, we would like to thank the Breed Clubs, Fund-raisers and home-checkers for their support, along with everyone who attended to-day. To date 26 dogs have been re-homed, 7 are waiting and 18 are on permanent foster.

The Chairman, Rod Slater, thanked the Secretary and gave special thanks to Mrs. Sam Hale for all her help and hard work. She had been a big help to Chris. He thanked Annette Rebmann for the work she puts in with the Newsletter and Website and thanked Margaret Birch for her time spent on the Sponsorship Scheme. He said thanks must also go to all the people who have helped with re-homing, transporting, home-checking, fundraising and everyone else who has helped make Collie Rescue the success it undoubtedly is.

TINKY AND DONATED ITEMS


